THE LEGACY OF ANNIE PEARL WORTHEY JOHNSON

Mrs. Annie Pearl Worthey Johnson was born June 30, 1932, to the proud parentage of Luther Craig and Viola Kerl Worthey in the Baileyville-Widerville Community of Rosebud Milam County, Texas. Annie was the fourth of ten children born to this 75 year plus Worthey marital union.

Annie Pearl grew up working the fields, learning homemaking skills, attending school and playing most sports offered to girls during her season. One of her fondest memories is having the academic honor of being Valedictorian of Wilson White Colored High School graduating class. On occasion, she still recites her graduation Valedictorian speech to family and friends. Her love for sports afforded her the opportunity to compete in track and field as well as play basketball and to travel to the UIL competitions at Prairie View A&M College.

Annie's Academic achievement led to her being offered a full scholarship to Tuskegee College & University, Tuskegee, Alabama; however, her father said it was too far away for her to go to school and be

away from home. She ultimately enrolled in the historical Paul Quinn College in Waco, Texas.

It was while attending Paul Quinn College that Annie Pearl met and married her soul mate, Mr. Velma Lee Johnson. Their first dwelling was in the Carver Park Neighborhood which was a room on Dallas Street. Later, they moved into a duplex on Dearborn Street, and then they were housed at 524 Carver. In 1960 they built a home at 705 Carver Avenue where she and her family have remained for sixty-five years!

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were

blessed to enjoy fifty-three years of marriage. The love of her life, Velma Lee, transitioned to eternal rest in 2007. They joyfully and lovingly parented and reared their three girls, Dr. Frances C. Worthey, Frankie D. Shaw (deceased, 2005) and Jacqueline L. "Cookie" Brown! Annie continues to be a marvelous "Granny" to Delvin (Tweedy), Alyshia (LeLe) and Johnathan. She is blessed with two sons-in-law, William Shaw and Elvis Brown Jr. Mrs. Johnson has always striven to exemplify that Biblical

Virtuous Woman found in Proverbs 31! And even today, "Her children arise and call her blessed;" (Proverbs 31:28).


Shop on Elm Street. The Jockey Club was the first black-owned barbershop in Waco. He worked there until his retirement in 2011.

her 'go to' channel. In her later years, she enjoys the Spectrum Channel 10, soap operas and game shows.



BABATUNDE: A MAN OF CULTURE, LEADERSHIP, AND COMMUNITY POWER

Babatunde's life story is a testament to cultural pride, community leadership, and unwavering dedication to uplifting Black voices across Central Texas and beyond. A native of the historic Washington Heights community in Harlem, New York, he grew up with deep family roots in the southern migrant traditions of eastern North Carolina. His name, which means "the father returns," has proven meaningful as he has spent his life preserving heritage, advancing education, and

strengthening the Black community.

After relocating to Central Texas, Babatunde founded and operated the influential Under One Roof African American Bookstore in Copperas Cove and Killeen. More than a bookstore, Under One Roof became a cultural landmark. It was the region's largest provider of multi-genre Black literature, music, organizational paraphernalia including Divine Nine and Masonic items, spiritual amulets, divination tools, and African

diaspora inspired home decor and hygiene products. For many people, it was the first place they encountered authentic and accessible representations of Black history

and culture.


His work expanded in many directions. Babatunde published The African Posta, a local newspaper devoted to Black perspectives and community concerns. He also launched Killeen's first Black Chamber of Commerce and founded the Killeen Poetry Slam, which produced state, national, and international spoken word champions. His passion for youth development led him to create Building Children Instead of Repairing Men, a mentorship program for Black boys ages five to thirteen from single mother households. He is also a co-founder of the Texas Alliance of Black Educators.

Drafted into the United States Army in 1969, Babatunde served for twenty-four years, including tours in Vietnam and Desert Storm. He retired honorably as a First Ser-

geant in 1993. His leadership extended into his home as well. He and his late wife of fifty-four years, Yetunde, may she rest in power, co-founded Under One Roof. Together they raised one daughter, Dr. Ketisha Jones, a Spelman College graduate and member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Incorporated. She now serves as Deputy Superintendent of Longview Independent School District. Babatunde is also the proud grandfather of Kahri, an honor student in his third year at Morehouse College majoring in biology.

Today his mission continues as he helps small Black businesses gain affordable access to television advertising. He reminds us of a guiding truth he has always lived by: To whom you give your money is to whom you give your power.

THE PURE HEART IS A MIRROR

At 79 years old, I am one of the newer members of the Waco Bahá'í Faith community. Born and raised Southern Baptist, I was nevertheless strongly drawn to the major tenets of the Faith: Unity of God; Unity of Humanity; Unity in Human Diversity; Equality of Men and Women; the Elimination of all Forms of Prejudice; Independent, Individual Investigation of Truth; Elimination of Extremes of Wealth and Poverty, among many other wonderful concepts.

The Bahá'í writings are vast, beautiful, exhaustively documented, verified and archived. The prayers, meditations, letters, histories, and commentaries are so rich in meaning, so inspiring in form...and there is no way I will ever be able to fully explore them. But one of the most beautiful metaphors I came across early in my study of the Faith is contained in this bit of writing from a mystical, poetic book entitled The Seven Valleys: "O My

Brother! A pure heart is as a mirror; cleanse it with the burnish of love and severance from all save God, that the true sun may shine within it and the eternal morning dawn. Then wilt thou clearly see the meaning of 'Neither doth My earth nor My heaven contain Me, but the heart of My faithful servant contains Me.' And thou wilt take up thy life in thine hand, and with infinite longing cast it before the new Beloved One."

The writer, one of the founders of our Faith, compares God to the sun: exceedingly powerful, life-giving, and incomprehensible. And he compares the human heart to a mirror and its power of reflectivity. Though it has a finite shape, weight, and position, a mirror contains no image of its own and merely reflects the appearance of whatever is placed before it. Likewise, when we empty ourselves of egotism, attachment to selfish desires, and turn our attention to God, our hearts become ready recipients for the rays of the sun, those spiritual attributes of God mentioned in the first passage above. Just as God is merciful, our human hearts will reflect a share of that mercy. Just as God is wise, our human hearts will to some degree manifest that wisdom."

In other words, Bahá'ís believe we are charged to live in such a way that the many attributes of God — mercy, splendor, grandeur, beauty, perfection, power, honor, light — are reflected for our fellow human beings by the mirrors of our souls. And the more flawlessly we can "polish" that mirror, the more clearly God's love can be seen in us. 
HENRY LEE, JR., A LIFE WELL-LIVED

Henry Lee Jr. entered the world in McClellan County on October 1, 1935 — and he's been working hard ever since. Literally. He picked cotton alongside his parents and siblings. According to him, school didn't start until all the cotton was picked, which explains why he side-eyes anyone who complains about "being tired."

He graduated high school, went to Paul Quinn, and joined the chorus — which was the best decision of his life, because that's where he met Dorothy Bryant. After graduation they married, raised five children, and built a 59-year love story, strong enough to withstand strokes, cancers, and Henry's "selective hearing." She passed in 2017, but he still talks about her like she's in the kitchen.

After serving in the Army, Henry worked at Rocketdyne — yes, rocket science. When the company moved to Delaware, Henry stayed in Texas, and began his career with the USPS. For 34 years he delivered mail, making friends, and collecting enough gossip to write a memoir. He retired at age 70, which he claims was "too young."

Henry attends Carver Park Baptist Church. He's a deacon, helps with the finance team, assists with culinary ministry, makes jokes about the men's chorus, and will volunteer for anything except arriving late. He is a beloved church member — mostly because he stands in the doorway after service, passing out compliments.

He is the last active charter member of the Kennedy Kings Elk Lodge, where he helps feed veterans, hand out holiday baskets, and host Easter egg hunts. Basically, he was doing community service before it got trendy.

Henry takes pride in his six children and eight grandchildren, all living lives based on the principles he and Dorothy instilled: be Christian, kind, generous, and keep the family together. After raising four sons, he is now blessed with seven granddaughters, which means he is finally outnumbered and they are all winning.

His son Gary chronicles their adventures online, making Henry social-media famous as "Old School." The family ensures he's present for every trip whether he wants to go or not. Henry likes to say, "Once the man, twice the child," usually right before someone hands him a cookie.

Henry credits his longevity to his relationship with God — and to the fact that he refuses to stress about anything outside his control. Fishing also keeps him relaxed and peaceful. His doctors say he's doing great "for a 90-year-old," which Henry interprets as permission to keep doing whatever he wants. He doesn't remember everything, but the stories he tells are memorable.

His motto these days is: "If I die, bury me and go to work on Monday," which is his way of saying: "Life goes on, with or without me."

STANDING FIRM WITH A NARCISSIST

One of the most important lessons in personal growth is learning how to protect your peace when dealing with a narcissistic person. Narcissists rely on manipulation, guilt, confusion, and emotional pressure to keep others off balance. The moment you understand this pattern, you begin to take back your power.

To let a narcissist know you are not someone who can be controlled, you must communicate through your behavior rather than through arguments. Narcissists thrive on emotional reactions. They lose interest when you respond with calm confidence. Speak clearly. Say what you mean. Do not raise your voice. Do not explain your-

self repeatedly. Once you give your answer, let it stand. Quiet strength sends a message they cannot ignore.

Setting boundaries is essential. You can say, "I will not continue this conversa-

tion while you are speaking to me in this way," or "I will decide what is best for me." Then step away if the behavior continues. Boundaries are not punishments. Boundaries are statements of self respect.

Most importantly, remind yourself daily that you do not need the approval of someone who refuses to acknowledge your worth. Narcissists often realize they cannot control you when you stop needing their validation. You become untouchable the moment you stop seeking permission to be yourself.

Stand firm. Protect your peace. Choose clarity over chaos. When you do, the narcissist receives the message loud and clear. You are no longer available for manipulation. You are choosing freedom.

THE STRENGTH OF A STEADY MAN

Dressed in a gown, house shoes, and a thin jacket, I gripped the keys that were pinned inside my bra. Oh yes, my bra. That was the safest place to keep my valuables, like my

car keys and what little money I had. I had learned a lot in my 29 years. With lightning speed, I dashed out the backdoor, tripping over the threshold, but still holding my balance and determination. Thank God my boy was spending the night with a friend. It was pitch-black dark outside, as I had no time to flip on the outside lights. I just needed to get out. Once inside my car, I let out a sigh, unaware that I had been holding my breath. Quickly locking the car doors, I knew I was on my way. The car was run down and bent up, but it was my path to freedom tonight and my only means of transportation. I'll never forget it. It was a gray and black Toyota, well....a fading gray and a fading black, a hatchback, about 8 years old at the time, and a stick. Ha! A stick. That could be a holdup since I was still in the learning stage, but I could handle it. I tried to crank the old trap, but it just clicked. I tried again, combining my efforts with a plea. "Please God, I need my car!" Just as the motor turned over, I heard that dreadful sound, a swatch-type sound, like an old screen door dragging. My God! He knew I was going to try to get away. He

knew, so he had unlocked the hatch back, ahead of time! He was in the back so fast; all I could do was bite my lip and jerk forward. "Stop the car, Lynn, and give me the money!" he yelled, as he swiftly crawled into the back seat. He lurched through the bucket seats so fast that my head literally seemed to spin, like the girl in the Exorcist. Grabbing the steering wheel, he yelled again, "Gimme the money, Lynn!" The Exorcist...I was sure that his voice changed. But tonight...no, not tonight. I kept driving, the car swerving across into the other lane and back again as he, too, gripped the wheel. I had so many similar stories to contend with, jumping fences to get my car back from the drug dealers, standing toe-to-toe and nose-to-nose with dealers who threatened to kill me if I didn't leave them alone about getting my car back, knocks on the door in the middle of the night from thugs demanding money my husband owed them, stealing my own car back and driving backwards, trying to miss the flying bullets. You name it; I just about dealt with it. Many times over the years, I walked into my house to find that every piece of furniture and every appliance was gone—sold in exchange for drugs. I remember waking up one Christmas Day to find that

my babies' gifts were gone, sold for drugs. Once, I frantically searched the streets of Tampa because my husband put our 6-year-old out of the car since it was "too dangerous to take him to the crack house," he said. This was before the days of cell phones. I don't even remember how I found my baby boy. I could go on and on, but the only thing that matters is that one day, I accepted the truth that I had to forgive if I expected to move on with my life. I have since come to grips with the truth, that my now ex-husband was a good person, who loved people. When he was straight, he would give away his last. When he was not, he would take another person's last. I literally saw him take his shirt off and give it away. Once he pulled off his watch and gave it away, and then took my watch and gave it away, too. He had a heart of gold, but in addiction, he was the devil. Still, I had to find a way to forgive. I owed it to myself, my children, and my God.





"A RETROSPECTIVE" THE PHOTOGRAPHY OF HAROLD LEWIS ON EXHIBIT AT BELL COUNTY MUSEUM

"A Retrospective" is now open on Main Street at the Bell County Museum in Belton. It is a photo exhibit that spans the fifty-year career of Mr. Harold Lewis, a long-time resident of Temple, Texas. The exhibit features both color and black-and-white portraits created with thirty-five millimeter film, a format that is completely non-digital. The exhibit will remain open to the public until February 2026.

Mr. Lewis has traveled the world capturing glimpses of life through his lens. His work has earned national honors and recognition. Even at the age of ninety-one, he wakes up each morning eager to embrace the world around him. As an Army veteran, he has gained a deep appreciation for life, an appreciation that has grown stronger with wisdom and time. He recalls that Waco's history was once neither admirable nor safe for people of color. For that reason, he reluctantly accepted a job in the city. He worked two years at the Freeman's Center and five years at the Heart of Texas Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. He states, "The twelve years I spent in Waco were the best work experience." Now retired, Mr.

Lewis continues to pursue his passion for photography and often says, "Retirement is a time of growth. It has allowed me the opportunity to focus on what is really important."

As an only child, Mr. Lewis describes himself as more of a loner than a joiner. He spent much of his childhood around adults who took time to teach him and nurture his curiosity. Because of their influence, he learned to educate himself in many subjects. He was reading by the age of three, and whenever he had a question, someone took the time to answer it. One of his uncles taught him how the dictionary was organized and how to use it.

Once he understood how to find, define, and apply new words, his world expanded. "I am learning each day, and my mind is exercised," he says. He also reflects on the advantages of self-realization, noting, "Nothing and no one programmed me. Habits are accumulated; they are not prioritized. It is best to figure out what works for you. By knowing that each day is a new day, I learn something new, and that gives me peace of mind. I was never one for pageantry."

Capturing iconic moments requires far more than simply pointing a camera and clicking a button. Film and developing cost money, so careful observation, an understanding of lighting, and technical camera knowledge are essential. Studying photographs, researching, and exercising patience are also important skills. As Mr. Lewis says, "As a photographer, you know what the frame is."

Many photographers inspired and influenced Har-

old Lewis's signature style. Among them are James Van Der Zee, who depicted the Black middle class in Harlem and is associated with the Harlem and Howard University renaissance; R. C. Hickman of the Dallas and Fort Worth region, who photographed local residents as well as visiting dignitaries; Benny Joseph, known for portraits that captured the spirit of Rhythm and Blues; and Ansel Adams, an environmentalist celebrated for his landscape photography.

When asked about his clarity of vision and remarkable memory, Mr. Lewis shared, "I see the practicality in what the Bible says and what you should do."

A SECOND CHANCE TO FIX YOUR MEDICARE PLAN: JANUARY 1 – MARCH 31

Every year, from January 1 through March 31, Medicare offers a second chance for certain people to make changes to their Medi-

care Advantage plan. This special time is called the Medicare Open Enrollment Period, and it is designed for one main purpose: to help you fix a plan that is not working for you.

Many people enroll in a plan during the fall and then realize after January 1 that something is wrong. Their doctor may not be in the network. Their prescriptions may cost more than expected. Their copays

may be higher than they were told. Or the benefits they expected simply are not there. If that happens, this enrollment window gives you one opportunity to make it right.

You can use this period only if you are already enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan as of January 1. If you qualify, you may make one change. You can either switch from one Medicare Advantage plan to another, or you can drop your Medicare Advantage plan and return to Original Medicare. If you return to Original Medicare, you are also allowed to add a standalone prescription drug plan.

What you cannot do during this time is join a Medicare Advantage plan if you were not already in one. This is a correction period, not a full open enrollment.

Any change you make will begin the first day of the next month. That means you don't have to wait long for your new coverage to

start.

The Open Enrollment Period exists so you are not trapped in a bad plan for an entire year. If your plan is costing you too much, limiting your doctors, or not meeting your needs, you still have time—but March 31 is the deadline.
