LaBraska Washington wins theatre scholarship

While many anxiously wait to hear from one college's admissions' commit-LaBraska Washingtee. found himself getting ton calls from 16 colleges. Yes, you read that correctlysixteen—the University of Central Oklahoma, Texas Wesleyan University, University of Nebraska, University of Texas at Arlington, SMU, Baylor, Angelo State University, University of the Ozarks in Alabama, University of Texas at Austin, Texas A&M University Commerce, Arizona State University, University of Northern Colorado, Sam Houston State, and the University of Essex Santa Fe in New Mexico.

Earlier this month, Washington attended Theatrefest 2014 in Dallas, Texas, where he auditioned before theatre and musical program officials representing over 50 colleges and universities. Sponsored by the Texas Educational Theatre Association, Inc., also known as TETA, the organization is geared towards high school and college students interested in all aspects of the

atre. Such interests include acting and singing of course, but they also include the technical aspects of theatre such as design and lighting.

Showcasing his talents at TETA, Washington performed The Navigator, a monologue by Eddie Antar, and Lost in the Wilderness, a song from Children of Eden. "The most exciting part about TETA was the audition process. Going in,

and seeing all these different colleges with their eyes all on me...trying to figure out if I was a good fit for their college, was so exciting to me."

His excellent performances landed him the \$2,000 Founders Scholarship, to be used at any college or university in the state of Texas. Still, he would be forced to wait for his results. A few days after the auditions, Washington's phone began ringing non-stop.

16 college representatives called Washington. During callbacks, Washington learned that he obviously made a powerful impression on the reps. He repeatedly heard the same comments—that he had a very strong presence, that he carried himself well and that he had an amazing voice.

Many concluded that at 19, Washington possessed a maturity that is a rare find for his age.

"They told me that based on my audition, I don't really have a cast type; I can

The college's description seems to have been written with Davis in mind. He is known for being a young man of integrity, discipline, godly character and yes, physical fitness. Davis is also described as a quiet but strong young man who is a positive role model for the younger boys and girls at his church, Second Missionary Baptist

Thomas L. Jennings (1791-1859)

1821—First African American to hold a U.S. patent for a dry-cleaning process.

Norbert Rillieux (1806-1894) 1846—Developed an evaporator for refining sugar, which is still used in the sugar industry and for making soap and other products.

Benjamin Bradley (1830-) 1840s—Developed a steam engine for a war ship. When he couldn't patent his invention, he sold it and used the money to buy his freedom.

Elijah McCoy

1872—Invented a lubricator for steam engines and started a manufac-

turing company. Invented over 50 other products.

Lewis Howard Latimer (1848-1929)

1881—Invented an electric lamp 1882—carbon filament for light bulbs.

Granville T. Woods (1856-1910)

Invented the telegraph for the railroad system. Invented over 60 other products.

Madame C.J. Walker (1867-1919)

1900's-- Developed a hair care system and other beauty products, becoming the first African American female millionaire.

Garrett Augustus Morgan (1877-1963)

1914—Invented a gas mask that protected soldiers from chlorine fumes during World War I.

1923—Invented the traffic signal (later replaced by traffic lights) with automated STOP and GO signs.

Frederick McKinley Jones (1892-1961)

1935—Invented refrigeration system for long-haul trucks and nearly 50 other refrigeration type inven-

1935—Invented a self-starting gas engine and movie projector parts.

Designed the heating system for Radio City Music Hall in New York. Received patents for 40+ products related to HVAC systems.

Mark Dean (1957-) Led the team of IBM scientists that developed the ISA bus—a device that increased the speed of personal computers.

Also led the team that designed the first processor chip.

VOICE Inc. receives new grant to address substance abuse

Viable Options In Community Endeavors Community Endeavors (VOICE) has received a new five year Community Coalition Program grant from the Department of State Health Services (DSHS) to be used in McLennan County. Over the past three years,

VOICE has provided drug and alcohol prevention education in school districts and community sites in McLennan and the surrounding 8 counties. This education has been provided to students in Kindergarten through 12th grade and has focused on healthy living, decision making

skills, coping skills, and the dangers of drugs and alcohol. The CCP grant will enable VOICE to better involve and engage the community to prevent and reduce alcohol and other drug use among youth and young adults.

As a result of this grant, VOICE has established a new community coalition around substance abuse concerns and has expanded their services to 18-25year olds. The focus of the Voice Against Substance Abuse Coalition (VASA Coalition) will be to implement environmental prevention strategies in order to reduce the use/abuse of alcohol, marijuana, and prescription drugs in McLennan County. This may involve things like reducing the access and sale of these substances to minors and helping to correct about the harms of these substances through media campaigns and other activities.

A large part of the work for the VASA Coalition during this first year of the grant will focus on conducting a needs assessment among 13 – 25 year olds in McLennan County. The needs assessment will help determine the extent of substance abuse among this demographic and help determine contributing factors associated with the abuse. Knowing this information will help the coalition and other service providers know how to focus their prevention efforts in the future. The VASA Coalition hopes to partner with area Universities/Colleges, school districts, police forces, and other community leaders to determine the best way to gather this information and address these con-




Artist development is a passion for Hawkins. The music business requires more than a voice and talent.

A 401k is simply a way to save for retirement. In 1978, an alternative to the pension was created. The money you pay into a 401k is tax deferred and so, the more you put into it, the less taxes you pay each year until you retire. It did sound great and so the 80's introduced the employee to change. You only pay taxes on the money you receive after it matures. Contributions are not taxed upfront and so you save on yearly taxes. If you leave your job you can transfer the money into an Individual Retirement Account.



Parts eight and nine of this series need to be studied in every house, especially the 'White House' because a servant is no greater than his/her lord/leader (John 15:20). When you have time, please get your Bible and read all of the given passages.

The United States is still the greatest nation in existence. That's why millions of illegals are here and don't want to leave. If they are not already Christians when they come, they'll have their gods packed in their suitcases or in their hearts (souls). wrong. Many wrongdoers try to cover their faces on camera. But I heard one gay man say that they are going to do all that they can to shut the mouths of those who try to make them feel badly about the way they were born. They feel badly because they are wrong and weren't born gay (Romans 1:16-32). That feeling of guilt and shame is not to condemn them, but to cause them to repent (2 Corinthians 7:8-10).

The propensity to sin is in every human being, but nobody is born an adulterous, fornicator, murderer,

alcoholic, hater, idolater, etc. Those are learned behaviors and choices. It cannot be compared to one's race which cannot be changed (Jeremiah 13:23); but being reborn will change any sinful habit (1 Corinthians 5:17). Why would God destroy cities and all the surrounding planes if He made homosexuals and lesbians (Genesis 19:1-29)? He almost wiped out the entire tribe of Benjamin because of homosexuality (Judges, Chapters 19-21).

Let us do all we can to love and convert all sinners (Ezekiel 33: 1-20; 1 John

3:1-10). If it's not right, it is sin (James 4:17; 1 John 5:17). Jesus said that sins will come, but woe to those who cause them to come and corrupt innocent children (Matthew 18:1-7).



Providence brings new procedure

Providence Health Center is the first hospital in Waco to offer a new outpatient technique for heart patients with completely blocked arteries who might not be candidates for open heart surgery. The specific condition treated is a Chronic Total Occlusion or CTO, which can cause chest pain and other health issues.

This new technique is now being performed by Dr. Charles Shoultz, III with Waco Cardiology Associates at Providence Health Center. Dr. Shoultz was invited to attend an intensive training for this latest minimally invasive technology technique in August 2013 and began the new technique in September 2013. He was specially chosen for this training based on the number of annual interventional procedures he performed at Providence Health Center.

In this procedure the physician uses a new catheter to get around the blockage by passing into the wall of the artery and going around the blockage. Although this procedure is not appropriate for every patient, it will allow specially trained interventional cardiologists like Dr. Shoultz to use a less invasive procedure to improve circulation in many patients who may not have other options for treating the blockage. Approximately 31% of patients referred for coronary angiography have at least one totally blocked artery. CTOs

affect the survival and quality of life of hundreds of thousands of people, and have historically been an untreatable condition for many patients. While some are treated with bypass surgery, up until this point 60% of patients with CTOs have been treated only with prescription drugs.


Washington took his mother's advice to heart. Now a sophomore theatre arts major at McLennan Community College, he has
